Ordered Built by the Spanish Government in 1812. It took St. Augustine 2 years to raise the funds and build it. The Spanish King then ordered it removed. It is believed to be the last original standing in the world.

Often confused with a similar statue elsewhere in St. Augustine, I am NOT father Lopez who landed with Pedro Menendez. I came to St. Augustine in 1777 and had been a priest with a small colony in New Smyrna called Minorcans.

Where is my statue?

Although plenty wide here at St. George St., at my East End on the Bayfront I am only a little more than 6' wide. I was built that way on purpose, to protect the Payroll and precious metal chests from being stolen.

What Street am I?



Although smaller than the gifts of the Lions from Mayor Anderson at the foot of the Lions Bridge, these Statues are on St. George Street and guard the gate of a park, given to the City by the Spanish Government in 1965. These lions are the Royal Spanish Lions.

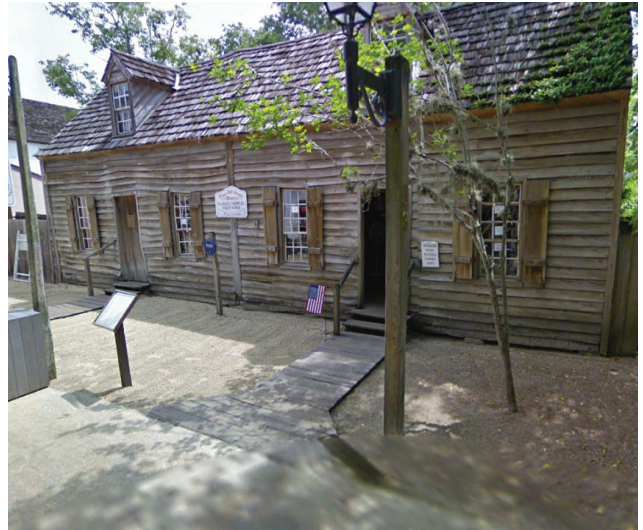
Where are they?

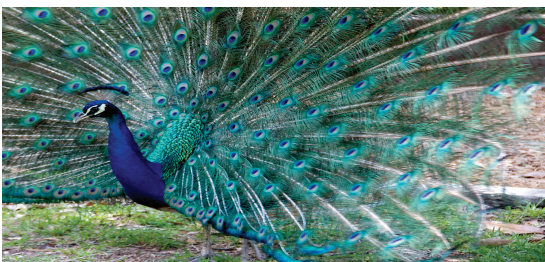
